The Wilderness Travel course uses the classroom learning environment to teach academic theory to support the practical skills learned on ATBO field courses on complex topics such as navigation and weather interpretation. Students will also explore special topics such as nature philosophy, avalanche skills training, and marine radio use.

This is a required course for the Adventure Tourism Business Operations Diploma program. It is typically taken in the first year of ATBO studies.

- demonstrate basic knowledge of weather patterns of the coast and mountain regions of BC;
- describe the pros and cons of using different types of communication devices to communicate from within wilderness areas; and
- demonstrate and apply basic avalanche safety protocols applicable for winter recreation.
