Description:

This course is designed for the intermediate back country skier or splitboarder who wants to improve their decision-making skills as appropriate for venturing into more complex avalanche terrain. Students will focus on the practical collection and analysis of relevant data as the basis for making decisions regarding travel in avalanche terrain. This course follows the curriculum for the Canadian Avalanche Centre Avalanche Skills Training Level 2 course. Successful students will receive a CAC AST Level 2 Certification.

Program Information:

This course is an elective course of the Adventure Tourism Business Operations Diploma program. It is typically taken in the second year of ATBO studies.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- interpret professionally prepared information presented online, such as avalanche bulletins, weather forecasts, and mountain conditions reports;
- develop a systematic approach towards evaluating snow stability and hazard;
- conduct a variety of tests in snow pits (such as compression tests, shear tests, burp tests, etc.) to collect information on snow stability;
- apply the Avalanche Terrain Exposure Scale (ATES) to assess the hazard posed by the surrounding terrain;
- determine an appropriate route selection to make informed decisions when skiing and splitboarding in avalanche terrain; and
- demonstrate an effective companion rescue.

- Snow crystals, weak layers
- Snowpacks, snow regions
- · Snow stability tests
- The influence of weather
- The avaluator, ATES, and terrain
- Trip planning
- · Judgement and decision making in avalanche terrain
