



## ENGL-102 – Introduction to Prose Fiction

### Description:

This course introduces students to the genre of prose fiction focusing on short fiction and the novel. In this course, students will read works by authors from diverse cultural and historical contexts while learning the foundational skills needed to analyze and produce academic writing about prose fiction. This course examines how narrative techniques and genre conventions shape meaning and encourages students to consider how literature reflects and challenges social and cultural contexts of their production and reception. This course emphasizes reading, research, and writing.

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### Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- interpret literary texts in class discussion and writing by analyzing how cultural, historical, and global context shape meaning;
- demonstrate the ability to approach prose fiction from various critical viewpoints such as gender, sexuality, disability, class, and race (including Indigenous Peoples' perspectives);
- compare representations of similar topics across selected prose fiction;
- explain how narrative techniques, literary devices, and genre conventions operate within prose fiction to create meaning;
- compose literary analyses that integrate appropriate textual evidence, and disciplinary terminology with focus on terminology relevant to the study of prose fiction;
- distinguish between summary and analysis, balancing discussion of themes and contexts with focused literary analysis;
- produce clear and cohesive academic writing with a focus on literary analysis, using a structured writing process that includes metacognitive reflection, research (from primary, secondary, and tertiary sources), planning, drafting, revision, and editing; and
- incorporate and document source material ethically and effectively, following disciplinary conventions and citation practices.

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### Course Topics:
