## **Description:**

English 202 is a survey of Canadian Literature from the 20th and 21st Century. In this course, students learn about the important themes and ideological concerns of Canadian Literature in the genres of poetry and prose. As part of the course, students read work from English-Canadian writers, as well as the works of some French Canadian writers may be included in translation. They will also study the work of some Indigenous Canadian writers. Because literary analysis is an important element of Canadian Literary studies, students will be introduced to some of the leading critics in the field.

- Describe the history, development, and context of Canadian literature from post WWII to the present;
- Recognize the depth and cultural significance of Canadian literature across cultures, including indigenous perspectives;
- Analyze and understand a range of forms, genres, and subgenres in Canadian literature;
- Approach Canadian literature from various critical viewpoints, considering such topics as gender, disability, class, and race;
- Develop analytical skills in formal structure and cultural analysis;
- Practice and polish writing and research skills, working on concision and clarity in composition and scholarly contribution to research; and
- Write a well-organized essay of literary analysis.

- Introduction to Canadian literature: CanLit and What Lit Can't Do
- "Who am I," "Where is Here," and "Our Being Here" of Canadian Identity
- "Garrison Mentality': Colonialism and Canadian Literature
