Through the examination and practice of historical and contemporary methods of handbuilding, throwing and extruder techniques with clay, the student will develop a personal aesthetic style including the consideration of form and function and imagination.

- demonstrate competency with firing pottery in ceramic kilns
- critique one's own and other's work
- examine and explore ceramic techniques
- recognize and develop 3D applications
- analyse ceramics in historical and contemporary contexts
- explore Indigenous history, perspective and contemporary practices in pottery that includes Ktunaxa knowledge

- Surface embellishment
- · Finishing styles
- Kiln firing
