Description:

This course introduces students to concepts of Indigenous knowledges, worldviews and epistemologies through witnessing Elder teachings, insights from Indigenous scholars and experiences of Indigenous community members. This course begins with a review of knowledge creation and ways of knowing. It then explores the value, importance and uniqueness of Indigenous ways of knowing and pedagogy in comparison to Western ways of knowing and pedagogy through exploring questions that are important to Indigenous peoples, communities, and nations.

This course is required for the Aboriginal Education Support Worker program. This course can be used as an elective in several University Studies programs.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- recognize the importance of learning from Indigenous peoples themselves (Indigenous Elders, Scholars, Researchers, Scientists, Community Leaders, Artists, Storytellers etc.);
- differentiate between Indigenous ways of knowing and Western ways of knowing;
- examine Indigenous research protocols, ethics, and methodologies;
- analyze the importance of Indigenous languages and language use, (ie. In the context of place names);
- reflect upon their own worldviews and ways of knowing;
- examine the ways that Indigenous knowledges are devalued within education formal education systems;
- explain the dynamic and evolving nature of Indigenous knowledge systems;
- · demonstrate how Indigenous knowledge is transferred intergenerationally; and
- identify ethical issues and solutions for research involving Indigenous people and their knowledge.

Course Topics:

- What is knowing and epistemology?
- Differences between Indigenous and western (WEIRD) ways of knowing
- · Indigenous concepts of education, teaching and learning
- Intergenerational transfer of knowledges
- The historical and contemporary devaluation of Indigenous Peoples' knowledge systems
- Language and its relation to culture
- Critical conversations on Cultural Appropriation
- Indigenous Peoples' knowledge and representation (ie. in music and art)
- History of Research in Indigenous communities
- Indigenous Research Methodologies
- Ethical considerations of Research with Indigenous Peoples/communities/nations
