Description:

This course explores the concept of Indigenizing in the context of the learning and teaching needs of Indigenous Peoples'. Students are guided to critically approach Indigenizing from Place Based Indigenous Peoples' knowledges and practices. Students apply their understanding of the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action, the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and Indigenous Peoples ways of knowing, world views and values to their own practices.

Program Information:

This course is required in the Aboriginal Education Support Worker Program. This course could also be taken as an elective in University Studies Programs.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- describe the concept of Indigenization;
 - discuss how to support Indigenization within professions;
 - examine the connection between Indigenous Peoples' languages, knowledge, pedagogies worldviews and their self-development efforts with Indigenizing Practice;
 - identify issues of appropriating Indigenous cultural knowledge, resources and education, including voice;
 - develop formalized lesson plans which incorporate Indigenous Peoples' perspectives and course content;
 - evaluate Indigenous Peoples' knowledge-generated resources and literature including current events;
 - demonstrate an understanding of the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples' as the BC Framework for reconciliation; and
 - incorporate Truth and Reconciliation Commissions Calls for Actions, and the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, into their professional practice.
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Course Topics:

- Indigenous Peoples' Knowledge Relationships, and Education
- Indigenization in the BC context including educational institutions
- Indigenous Peoples' pedagogy and lands based "traditional" learning
- Education and Truth and Reconciliation
- UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples
- Culture, Indigenous Peoples and Places
- Responsibilities and Considerations with respect to bringing Indigenous knowledges into the classroom
- Cultural Vulturism; Appropriation; Responsibilities and Limitations
