## **Description:**

This course prepares the student to canoe tandem and solo in lake water and in class 1-2 river conditions. Competency is gained with basic paddle strokes, maneuvers and rescue techniques in both flatwater and moving water environments. Curriculum follows the Recreational Canoeing Association of BC Lakewater Basic Solo and Tandem, and Moving Water Basic Tandem Curriculum.

- demonstrate knowledge and skills at a basic tandem lakewater and basic tandem moving water standard determined by Recreational Canoeing Association of British Columbia;
- maneuver the canoe in tandem and solo on lakewater and in tandem on moving water;
- demonstrate wide variety of strokes to gain mastery of the canoe; and

demonstrate tandem self-rescue skills.

# **Course Topics:**

- Introduction to strokes in tandem bow and stern positions and in solo
- Canoe repairs, knots and ropes, equipment variation and standards
- · Lake and river water hazards, wind and waves
- · Solo paddling positions, trim, strokes
- · Maneuvering canoe on basic river currents
- History of canoeing
