Description:

Health and Healing 1: Introduction to the Context of Health and Health Promotion

Students are introduced to health promotion and explore how health is conceptualized. Students examine their own personal beliefs relating to health and examine immerging impacts on health, such as climate change. Students examine the health of diverse Canadians using a variety of health information sources in order to understand the individual and macro level conditions that impact health. Students examine the Canadian health care system, its effect on health status, and factors that contribute to health inequity, including gender, sexual orientation. There is attention to the exigencies that impact Indigenous health, and an introduction to the Social Determinants of Health. Students are introduced to the concept of primary health care and explore the contributions of professional nursing to the health of individuals, families, and communities across the lifespan.

Program Information:

This course is required for the first year of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program at College of the Rockies. The materials in this course represent a component of a four-year integrated BSN program.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- describe historical and current theoretical understandings of health, health promotion, and primary health care in relation to nursing practice;
- discuss how RNs can impact the health status of Canadians;
- identify how contextual differences and beliefs about health influence health behaviors;
- identify factors contributing to health inequities in Canada and globally;
- demonstrate a beginning understanding of epidemiology in the context of physical and mental health:
- describe information communication technologies in the delivery of care;
- recognize the relationship between colonization, the social determinants of health, and health inequities for Indigenous peoples;
- describe the upstream drivers of climate change and ecological determinants of health;
- describe anti-Indigenous racism and its impact on the health of Indigenous peoples;
- describe the role and responsibilities of RNs to ensure individual, family, and communitycentered care through interprofessional practice; and
- demonstrate foundational nursing assessments and skills within the context of decision making for nursing practice.

Course Topics:

Process

Learning activities are designed to promote engagement with the foundational principles of the curriculum and the identified concepts of the course. Learning activities address theoretical perspectives related to health promotion, prevention, and primary health care, and how these are relevant to the overall curriculum philosophy. Learning activities promote critical thinking and are relevant to current nursing practice. Learning activities may be designed to disrupt taken-forgranted assumptions about health and traditional Western approaches to healing. Learners are encouraged to participate in active dialogue about health with others, including their resource

family, and to share experiences arising from those learning activities.
