Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Discuss the various roles, responsibilities, and scope of practice of the Registered Nurse with other professionals in diverse contexts;
 - Engage in professional nurse-client relationships and collaboration with individuals and families;
 - Engage with others to explore different perceptions and personal meanings of health and health promotion; and
 - Integrate first semester course concepts into nursing practice activities.
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Course Topics:

Learners develop their professional nursing practice, critical thinking, and critical reflection. Practice experiences are supported by praxis seminars, which provide opportunities to examine theories and concepts for discussion, exploration and integration. Praxis involves the examination of the dynamic interplay between theory and practice. Praxis is actualized by critical reflection, journaling and active participation in nursing practice seminars. Practice experiences provide opportunities for learners to begin developing their own nursing practice related to health promotion and health, as well as observe nurses working in diverse practice settings.
