This course is an introduction to the discipline of nursing. Participants explore the historical development of nursing knowledge and theory as well as contemporary understandings of nursing as a discipline and the body of knowledge that defines it. Relationships between practice, theory and research are explored.

- gain an understanding of nursing as a knowledge-based profession and a beginning awareness of the relationship between knowledge and nursing practice
- gain an understanding of nursing scholarship and a beginning ability to read and critique research
- compare and contrast the discipline of nursing to that of other health disciplines

Course Topics:

Process:

Praxis is the underlying process that is used in the course. Participants will have the opportunity to critically examine how nurses "know". Beginning from a consideration of oneself as a "knower", participants continue to explore how to become "knowers" within the discipline of nursing, and how to engage as active participants in the development of the growing body of knowledge in nursing. Critical reflection, values, experiences and theory are integrated. Building on previous knowledge, participants develop skill in critical evaluation of knowledge. The intent is that participants engage in an interactive process.
