Description:

Professional Practice 2: Discipline of Nursing: Knowledge Development and Inquiry

In this course, students examine the discipline of nursing and the relationship between nursing practice, theory, and research. Students explore contemporary understanding of the discipline of nursing and the body of knowledge that defines it by approaching knowledge for nursing as an intersection of relationship and inquiry, research, and evidence-informed practice. Students are introduced to nursing theorists, the nursing metaparadigm, and nurse's ways of knowing, including the essentials of informatics, and its role in guiding practice. Students develop skill in accessing, reviewing and appraising evidence promoting community and societal health.

Program Information:

This course is required for the first year of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program. The materials in this course represent a component of a four-year integrated BSN program.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- articulate the role of scholarship and inquiry for the discipline of nursing including the historical and contemporary development of nursing theory;
- recognize and discuss the influence of paradigms, worldviews, and theories of nursing on one's own approach to nursing on the provision of person-centered care;
- develop and demonstrate critical reflection skills to examine the role and contributions of nursing knowledge to one's practice;
- discuss key principles of Indigenous ways of knowing in order to build a foundational antiracist approach of caring for Indigenous peoples;
- access, review, and appraise academic sources to inform an evidenced base for evolving nursing practice;
- compare and contrast the discipline of nursing to that of other health disciplines;
- build professional relationships to support best practice, demonstrate strong team skills and support members of the healthcare team; and
- critique the politics of interdisciplinary knowledge development in relation to nursing knowledge.

Course Topics:

Process:

Praxis is the underlying process that is used in the course. Students will have the opportunity to critically examine how nurses "know". Beginning from a consideration of oneself as a knower, students continue to explore how to become "knowers" within the discipline of nursing, and how to engage as active participants in the development of the growing body of knowledge in nursing. Critical reflection, values, experiences, and theory are integrated. Building on previous

knowledge, students develop skill in critical evaluation of knowledge. Students engage in interactive learning processes.
