Description:

Nursing Practice 1: Introduction to Nursing Practice and Coming to Know the Client

Students apply knowledge from previous and concurrent courses to their beginning understanding of nursing practice. This introductory practice experience provides opportunities to develop caring relationships with groups, families and individuals across the lifespan. Emphasis is placed on health assessment and coming to know how individuals understand and promote their health, and the role of the nurse in partnering with the person in this process. Students work with interprofessional teams in the home and community, in agencies, and care settings as they begin to develop their professional identity and use critical reflection, the decision making model, and professional standards to support safe nursing practice. Students are introduced to the systems which support delivery of health care, such as organizational structures, occupational health and safety, information and communication technologies and agency polices.

Program Information:

This course is required for the first year of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. The materials in this course represent a component of a four-year integrated BSN program.

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- utilize relational practice skills to develop caring relationships with individuals and their families;
- demonstrate collaborative, responsive, and responsible communication skills with individuals, families, instructor, peers and the interprofessional team;
- identify effect of bias, prejudice, stigma, oppression and colonialism on Indigenous health;
- reflect on the role and scope of the RN and others on the interprofessional team in achieving health outcomes across diverse health settings;
- participate in co-learner/co-teacher relationships that foster transformative learning;
- apply the decision making model to situations within a practice setting;
- conduct a basic health assessment, from a health promotion perspective, utilizing nursing knowledge, client and team input, data collection, observation, and inquiry to appropriately provide client centered care;
- prioritize nursing actions to provide timely and safe nursing care for one person;
- report and document assessments and care in a professional and accurate method using appropriate communication platforms (e.g. EHR, chart);
- demonstrate self-awareness and professionalism, while consistently maintaining confidentiality, in nursing practice;
- use critical reflection to actively engage in the construction of their own knowledge through praxis; and
- recognize safety principles and identify hazards (e.g. Physical, chemical, ergonomic, and psychosocial) in the practice setting.

Course Topics:

Process:

Students engage in professional nursing practice, critical thinking, and critical reflection in a variety of practice settings caring for healthy people. These activities may occur in acute care, community agencies or in the homes of individuals and families. Practice experiences are supported by seminars, which provide opportunities to examine theories and concepts for discussion, exploration, and integration. Praxis involves the examination of the dynamic interplay between theory and practice. Praxis is actualized by critical reflection, journaling, and active participation in nursing practice seminars. Practice experiences provide opportunities for students to develop decision making skills with contextual awareness and exercise health assessment skills that enable them to provide safe nursing care.
