Description:

The first practice experience provides learners with an opportunity to integrate theory from Level 1 coursework into practice. Learners gain experience in various settings with a focus on the healthy client. This practice experience emphasizes the role of the Practical Nurse, personal care skills, organization of care, focused assessment, beginning medication administration and professional communication.

This course is one of eight courses required in Level 1 of the Practical Nursing program. Satisfactory completion of this course is required to progress to the next level.

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- practice within relevant legislation, Entry-Level Competencies for Licensed Practical Nurse (BCCNM, 2021), Scope of Practice: Standards, Limits, Conditions for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2020), Professional Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2020), and Practice Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, current editions), the Nurses (Licensed Practical) Regulation (2020) and facility-specific policy and procedures;
- demonstrate safe, competent, ethical care and transfer of skills;
- practice with integrity and accountability in a patient care context;
- begin to look critically at clinical decision making and knowledge of assessment to plan, implement and evaluate care in predictable situations with faculty guidance;
- with faculty guidance, make practice decisions that are client-specific and consider client acuity, complexity, variability and available resources;
- demonstrate a collaborative approach with other members of the interprofessional health care team to meet the collective needs of the clients;
- provide a caring environment for clients by connecting, sharing and exploring with them in a collaborative relationship;
- provide person-centered care that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual and is sensitive to culture and diversity;
- describe the PN role in providing leadership, direction, assignment and supervision of unregulated care providers;
- with faculty guidance, apply professional communication to advocate for clients in their care;
- apply evidence-informed practice in the client nurse relationship at a beginning level;
- identify own values, biases, and assumptions on interactions with clients and other members of the health care team at a beginning level;
- explain the need for continuous learning to maintain and enhance competence;
- demonstrate beginning competence in assessment of healthy adult;
- apply knowledge of growth and development in assessment of healthy adults; and
- provide compassionate, culturally sensitive and aware relational and trauma-informed care for all cultures with consideration for First Nation, Inuit and Métis clients, their families and communities.
