Medication administration, nursing care, organization, comprehensive health assessment, wound care and introduction to leadership are emphasized in this course.

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- practice within relevant legislation, Entry-Level Competencies for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2021), Scope of Practice: Standards, Limits, Conditions for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2022), Professional Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, 2020), and Practice Standards for Licensed Practical Nurses (BCCNM, current editions), the Nurses (Licensed Practical) Regulation (2020) and facility-specific policy and procedures;
 - apply the definition of consent in providing safe, competent, culturally safe and ethical care;
 - demonstrate critical thinking, clinical judgment and knowledge of assessment to plan, implement and evaluate care of older adults with assistance as required;
 - apply the nursing process to a variety of health challenges in the residential care setting;
 - demonstrate consistent client specific decision making that considers client acuity, complexity, variability and available resources;
 - demonstrate a collaborative approach with other members of the health care team to meet the collective needs of older adult clients;
 - provide a caring environment for patients by connecting, sharing and exploring with them in a collaborative relationship;
 - deliver person-centered care that recognizes and respects the uniqueness of each individual and is sensitive to culture and diversity, and applies principles of trauma-informed practice;
 - demonstrate various communication strategies in communicating with clients with cognitive, sensory and/or mental health disorders;
 - collaborate with faculty to provide leadership, direction, assignment and supervision of unregulated care providers in the residential care setting;
 - advocate for change reflecting evidence-informed practice;
 - identify own values, biases and assumptions on interactions with clients and other members of the health care team; and
 - Participate in continuous learning to maintain and enhance competence.

- Inter-professional approach to practice
- Comprehensive assessment of the older adult
- Medication administration
- Chronic wound care

Evaluation Notes Comments:

When a client/patient is referenced in an assignment, students must only use the term client or patient. No identifying markers (e.g. names, initials, room number, etc.) are to be used. Late assignment: a 15% penalty will be applied for each day past due date for late submissions. If any assignment is more than three (3) days late it will be assigned a grade of "0".

No rewrites will be granted for any assignments or exams within this course.
