- Compare the impacts of human use on natural areas and socio/cultural contexts and describe planning and management approaches to mitigate these impacts.
- Identify stakeholders involved in sustainable tourism and explain their role in planning and management.
- Analyze the interrelations and implications between climate change and tourism
- Describe the "carrying capacity model," and how this model can influence the management of natural resources for tourism
