#### **Description:**

The Mountain Adventure Skills Training Program (MAST) is an experiential and applied full-time nine-month, on-campus certificate that prepares students for employment in the field of Adventure, Adventure Tourism or to continue their studies toward university degrees. Students are introduced to a broad range of skills, earn certifications, and develop technical knowledge through class lectures, projects and multiple outdoor field courses. MAST provides the foundation for competency and professional pursuit in various outdoor adventure disciplines. After completion of the MAST certificate, students may find employment in entry-level jobs in adventure tourism and recreation businesses: Adventure Guide or Instructor, Professional Ski Patrol, Raft Guide, Tail Guide – Cat Skiing, Ski/Snowboard Instructor, Outdoor Educator or Instructor .

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#### **Program Information:**

The MAST program follows the BC Provincial Adventure Tourism Certificate Program Standardized Core Curriculum.

A grade of "D" grants credit, but may not be sufficient as a prerequisite for sequential courses.

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### **Program Learning Outcomes:**

By the end of the program, participants will

- Apply expert and technical knowledge of various outdoor activities to effectively lead oneself and others.
  - Employ analytical skills to evaluate situations, identify challenges and propose solutions across diverse contexts and environments.
  - Demonstrate professionalism and skills for transfer of learning to future settings, including diligence, flexible learning mindset, teamwork, self-reflection, and self-care.
  - Practice and refine interpersonal skills, such as presenting professionally, working in teams, building rapport, using and inspiring ethics, listening, resolving conflicts, and maintaining confidentiality.
  - Communicate efficiently and effectively with diverse audiences in the mountain adventure field, using industry-specific language to educate, and adapt communication methods to different contexts and situations.
  - Manage risk in mountain adventure by developing a hazard catalogue, analyzing probability and consequence, understanding bias, refining decision-making practices through self-reflection, and managing uncertainty.
  - Apply business skills, including market analysis, strategic thinking, planning, marketing, and entrepreneurship, and integrate industry knowledge related to the adventure sector: hiring and retention, career paths, certification streams, and industry regulatory bodies.
  - Interpret and apply knowledge of natural and human history, stewardship, and Indigenous Studies to enhance outdoor adventure experiences.
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### **Prior Learning and Recognition: Yes**

Students are able to request formal recognition of their prior learning or experience outside the

classroom. Challenge examination, portfolio-assisted assessment, work-based assessment or a combination of assessments that is appropriate to identify, assess, and recognize prior skills, competencies, and knowledge to achieve course credit.
